Train Station Landscaping has begun with materials





GLENBROOK TAKES PART IN A COMMUNITY DESIGN WORKSHOP

GNA's formation was inspired 1 1/2 years ago by the opportunity for Glenbrook to participate in a community design workshop that was part of the updating of the Stamford Master Plan. Glenbrook residents took part in an intensive "retreat" with professional planners, architects, transportation specialists, and urban designers from New York City, creating drawings that envisioned our recommendations for the revitalization of Glenbrook's commercial center. Why that design focus? Because Glenbrook (like Springdale) is a special case in Stamford, with its own small downtown and train station. To make a long story short, we designed ways to recreate Glenbrook's village atmosphere, centered around the train station. We presented the plans to city officials in March of 2000 as enhanced input into the Master Plan.

BACKGROUND ON GLENBROOK

Glenbrook, like Springdale, developed as a residential neighborhood after the opening of the New Canaan branch railway stations in Glenbrook and Springdale in 1868. Maps from 1892 show Glenbrook as an eastern suburb of Stamford, two miles from town hall. It remained separate from Stamford until the mid 20th century, and there are still some longtime residents who write their address as "Glenbook, Conn." Glenbrook used to be a selfcontained small town where everyone knew each other. It was a "company town" for the Phillips Milk of Magnesia Factory.

Certain landmarks still remain today: Union Memorial Church, St. Maurice Church, Stark Elementary School with its playground and adjoining Northrop Little League field, the fire house, Glenbrook Community Center (formerly Glenbrook School), the train station area, the Milk of Magnesia water tower, and

the Noroton River (now visible to the public only from two bridges). The former Phillips property, along Glenbrook Road near the Darien border, has been subdivided and developed as; Research Park, Glenbrook Industrial Park. Riverwalk and a Condominiums. concentration of satellite dishes with the intriguing Glenbrook name o f Earthstation.

A change in housing stock and zoning has affected the character of Glenbrook in recent decades and into the present day. This has changed the look of entire streets. As a result Glenbrook is more populated, less friendly, less attractive, and has more traffic, less open space and fewer trees. It doesn't appear that anyone has been looking out for the community as a whole.

Because of its history, Glenbrook still has many of the ingredients that could make it seem like a small town: a train station, post office, fire department, elementary school, community center, a little league division, churches, stores, and restaurants.

What it lacks, though, is unity. The Glenbrook Neighborhood Association hopes to be the force that pulls together residents, merchants, and other stakeholders interested in recreating the feel of old Glenbrook. Won't you join us in this effort?

Glenbrook now has a bakery and cappuccino! Farrara's Cream Puff Bakery has relocated from High Ridge Road and has a 15-year commitment to Glenbrook.

Roussel Photography, a Designer Portrait Studio, has also relocated from High Ridge Road and has is located on the second floor, above the bakery.
